

OCTOBER 27, 2024 THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Today's Focus: Insiders and Outsiders

The world Jesus lived in operated substantially through the categories of honor and shame, which determined who was in and who wasn't. This, Jesus shows us, isn't God way.

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31.7-9

Jeremiah's oracle dynamically interweaves images of joy and sorrow. It exhorts the people to praise God joyfully for saving the scattered remnant of Israel, whom God will gather and guide back from wherever they are, with compassion and "on a level road." This image underscores the ease of their return from exile. All who walk this road even the disabled, the pregnant, and those in labor—will do so "without stumbling" and with constant access to water. The mention of the "labor" of pregnancy, however, offers a sober reminder that their new life will come only after pain. Likewise, the people's "weeping" as they walk vividly illustrates their grief over what has happened, even as they journey forward. Jeremiah thus powerfully acknowledges that their past trauma of exile will indelibly shape the people's future identity.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 5.1-6

In the Old Testament, the effectiveness of the high priest was directly related to his humanity, for he too knew sin. Likewise, as the second reading recounts, it is Jesus' humanity that makes him a good high priest. He truly knows the experience of weakness (Hebrews 5:2), and is therefore able to make a sin offering for himself and the people (Hebrews 5:3). Divinely appointed (Hebrews 5:4), Christ did not choose this role. Rather, it was God who called him first as "son" (Hebrews 5:5) and then as "a priest forever" (Hebrews 5:6). But unlike the high priests of old who had to sacrifice repeatedly, Jesus' offering of himself occurred once for all (Hebrews 9:26).

GOSPEL: Luke 6.12-19

In a Gospel full of healing miracles, this is the last one. Mark presents Bartimaeus as a model disciple. He does a lot of things "right" from Mark's perspective. For one, he persistently seeks Jeus despite other's opposition. The Twelve, on the other hand, will abandon Jesus when the going gets tough (14:50). By calling Jesus "son of David," he recognizes Jesus' identity as Messiah and king. Unlike the rich man in 10:17-30, Bartimaeus abandons his few possessions to go to Jesus. James and John had just asked Jesus to grant any request of theirs, which turned out to be for seats of honor. Here, Jesus asks Bartimaeus what he wants, Bartimaeus simply wants "to see," a request for physical sight that also works metaphorically as a desire to "see" Jesus clearly. Finally, Jesus instructs Bartimaeus to "Go your way" and Bartimaeus decides to follow Jesus "on the way." In other words, his way is Jesus' way, even though, as the events of the Passion will show, Jesus's way is difficult and dangerous.

REFLECTIONS:

- When have you persisted because your faith or God's justice impelled you?
- Have you ever been rebuked or silenced? What did that experience teach you?
