HOLY FAMILY

Today's Focus: The School of Faith

We think of church, or perhaps religious education classes, or a parish school as the places we learn about faith. But none of these is more central to learning to live our faith than the household and family.

FIRST READING: 1Samuel 1.20-22, 24-28 For as long as he lives, Samuel is given to the Lord.

Earlier in First Samuel, Hannah had prayed fervently at the altar at Shilo (this story predates the Jerusalem temple). Though beloved by her husband, she had no children. She makes a vow that if God blesses her with a son, she will dedicate him to God, and adds, "No razor shall ever touch his head" (1Samuel1:11). The second promise indicates a Nazarite vow (Numbers 6:4-5), which designated a person as holy to the Lord. In today's reading, Hannah fulfills her vow, bringing the young Samuel to serve the priest Eli. Though strange to our ears, the story demonstrates the faithfulness of both Hannah and God, both of whom fulfilled their commitments.

SECOND READING: 1 John 3.1-2,21-24 We are called children of God: and that is what we are.

The second reading introduces us to the perspective not of the mother, as in the first reading, but of the children. Continuing the theology of the Gospel of John, the elder who authored First John views the community as children of God (see John 1:12). This creates a liminal space in which the world does not "know" or recognize them (1 John 3:1). In fact, the community itself doesn't know what is yet in store for them as children of God. The elder advises them to keep the commandments of Jesus: believe in his name, and love one another. Thus, whatever is to happen, they will be assured of "remaining" in Jesus, the Johannine term for being disciples.

GOSPEL: Luke 2.41-52

His parents found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers.

In the Gospel reading, Luke concludes his Infancy Narrative with an anecdote that foreshadows the life of the adult Jesus. Luke has portrayed Mary and Joseph as a righteous couple who follow the dictates of the law (Luke 1:21-24). As the story opens, they are on pilgrimage to Jerusalem for Passover when their child goes missing. The reference to finding Jesus after "three days" clearly points to his burial, and his sitting in the midst of the teachers may point to his resurrection. "Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" strengthens the resurrection imagery. Surrounding the allusion to his death and resurrection is Luke's depiction of the anxiety of his family ((2:45, 48). The story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus stands as a bookend to this passage; both frame the life and death of Jesus within the human experience of his family and disciples.

REFLECTIONS:

- Name what your family taught you about faith, love, and life, for good or ill.
- How do you teach others to love and recognize the dignity of all?
